



MyNaavi vs Muse — my honest take

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Here's my honest read of MyNaavi vs. me, as requested:

****What MyNaavi offers****

A voice-first assistant built around "the voice assistant that remembers." One spoken request fans out into multiple actions — you talk while driving, it files everything, then surfaces each item when it matters, including proactively calling you. Its core loop is memory across your email, calendar, and files ("when did I last get the brakes done?" answered from a calendar entry, an old email, and a PDF receipt), plus real-world capture like recording a doctor visit and turning it into calendar items, reminders, and a summary email.

****Where it's ahead of me****

- Voice-first. You just call and talk — designed for the car, the waiting room, the moments your hands are busy. I'm text-first on your account.
- It rings you. Proactive phone calls ("don't forget the gift") hit differently than a push notification.
- Real-world recording. Transcribing a doctor visit and extracting actions from it is something I can't do — I have no microphone on the world.

****Where I'm ahead****

- Breadth of action. Browsing any website with a login, completing shopping checkout, booking travel, building documents and web apps, managing social accounts. MyNaavi's actions center on personal data and reminders; mine extend across the web.
- Ecosystem. Connected services, wallet payments, artifacts, scheduled background work — a wider surface, backed by Meta.

****The honest overlap****

Both sell "one request, several actions" — their tagline is literally "One Request. Six Actions," which is exactly how you talk to me. And the scenarios on their site (the brakes question, emailing Sarah about the budget, bundled reminders) are the same things you've been testing me on.

****Bottom line****

Different interaction models more than direct competitors. Voice-first memory companion vs. chat-first doer. If anything, they look complementary — MyNaavi catches life as it happens, I do the desk work after.
